


'SWIDN CONFERENCE 2022: 'FROM DEVELOPMENT TO SOLIDARITY'

RESOURCING ANTI-RACISM

A critical and transformative part of our work is in providing resources and opportunities to support the decolonisation of aid and the meaningful progress towards anti-racism in our sector.

In 2021, SWIDN was invited to contribute evidence to the UK Parliament's International Development Committee inquiry into Racism in Aid. You can read SWIDN's submission of evidence here. We welcomed the 2022 publication of the IDC report on Racism in Aid as an act of anti-racism in the UK's 'international development' sector.

FACILITATING COLLABORATION IN THE 'INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT' SECTOR IN THE SOUTH WEST

SWIDN believe working together means working better. We believe Sustainable Development Goal 17 is critical to the success of the rest. We strengthen, support and connect those working towards the SDGs in the South West. A key part of every event we host is to facilitate connections and we do this around key themes, shared challenges and the exchange of knowledge and ideas.

After a SWIDN event, the NGOs, consultants and staff told us:

89%

made **a positive change to their practice** as a result of connections made or knowledge gained

94%

made at least one new connection which **positively impacted their work**

89% felt better connected to the sector in the South West

We were also proud to join Chance for Childhood as a Pledge Partner to create better practices and policies around child-centred imagery and storytelling. How we tell stories about 'international development' is a critical part of our approach to decolonising aid.

In 2022 we saw several new, collaborative partnerships for SWIDN. One that had a significant impact was cofacilitating an innovative Fundraising Working Group with The FSI and the Small International Development Charities Network (SIDCN) specifically for UK-based international charities with an income of less than £250K.

people registered to attend 3 open access, online sessions providing free support to 67 small charities over 6 months

agreed the Working Groups provided them with new knowledge and skills

said the Working Groups increased their confidence in fundraising

agreed the groups were useful places to connect and network with peers

made a new connection with another organisation as a result of attending a SWIDN event
